



The Body exposed

The work of a local artist has been juxtaposed with that of one of the twentieth century's greatest sculptors.

Residents can see the results of the propinquity at the National Gallery. It opened a joint exhibition of sculpture by Caymanian artist Al Ebanks and original lithographs and etchings by the late, great British sculptor, Henry Moore, on Thursday 25 April.

Mr. Ebanks, a member of the Native Sons Caymanian artists group,

has 24 creations in the show. Of these, all but three have been fashioned from a ceramic and acrylic resin composite. The remaining trio are carved from coralstone, a type of rock found in Texas.

There are 17 Henry
Moore drawings in the exhibition. These are hung on
the walls, overlooking Mr.
Ebanks' pedestal-mounted
works. All pieces in the exhibition are for sale, said a
press release from Government Information Services.
